

Molly the Black Labrador Retriever was surrendered to the animal shelter in mid-December 2020 because she was being kept as an outdoor dog and her former owners felt she was not getting the attention she deserved. Their decision probably saved her life.

2020, we got a call from a family in West Union, Ohio. A very timid and extremely pregnant stray had arrived at their property about two and a half months earlier. The family took her in and "Girl". as they called her, had a litter of puppies. The family cared for Girl and her puppies until the puppies were weaned and no longer needed their mama.

Once the puppies were off to their new homes, Girl was brought to the animal shelter. She was so scared! Loud, noisy kennels are terrifying places for timid animals like Girl. The new sights and smells of an animal shelter, as well as the dozens of strangers that come through the building each day, test the mettle of even the most socialized dogs. Poor Girl was neither socialized nor trusting.

vaccinated and advertised her for adoption, but she did not "show well" at the shelter. Girl would retreat to the farthest corner of her kennel and cower in fear whenever a stranger walked past.


Finally, on January 12, a wonderful partner rescue decided to accept Girl into one of their foster homes.

Here is what they wrote to us, "She is a very timid dog and we weren't sure how long it would take her to trust humans. The answer to that was 48 hours, all thanks to McDonald's French fries."

We are so happy to report that Girl is thriving in her foster home. She is well on her way to finding a loving forever home of her own.

After she arrived at the animal shelter, Molly was quickly placed in a foster-toadopt home with a family that had been searching for a rescued Black Lab for months. As with all of our foster placements, HSAC takes care of the needs of the pet until it is officially adopted. Molly was scheduled to be examined by a licensed veterinarian so that she could be spayed and vaccinated prior to being made available for adoption. Sadly, Molly tested positive for canine heartworm disease during that first vet visit. Due to Molly's young age and general overall good health, we are hopeful that she will be able to beat her diagnosis. HSAC is working with Molly's veterinarian and her foster family to have her treated. The treatment involves antibiotics and carefully monitored injections of medicine to kill the parasites inside her heart. Molly must be kept calm and quiet for several weeks - no easy task

for a fun-loving lab! Once Molly has completed her treatment for heartworm, her foster family hopes to make her a permanent member of their family. They are already totally in love with her, especially her two little human "siblings"!
